It is your responsibility to make yourself aware of these policies.

Below are listed some of the basic policies we think will be the most helpful to you (where the wording differs, the Yellow Book and the Residence Guidelines will take priority). In general, if you are considerate of others and take responsibility for your actions, we will all have a good time. If you have any questions, just speak with your don, the Dean of the Assistant Dean.

#### Noise and Quiet Hours

Finding quiet time in residence is hard because we all live together in close quarters. During Quiet Hours, it should be quiet enough for you to sleep or study. This doesn't mean you can be really noisy outside of Quiet Hours—others may be studying or napping, so please be considerate at all times.

Sunday to Thursday, 10:00 pm - 8:00 am

Monday, 12 midnight - 8:00 am

Friday to Saturday, 1:00 am - 10:00 am

Exam Periods - 23 hour quiet, with one hour of relaxed quiet between 8 pm and 9 pm

During quiet hours noise levels should be such that students are able to sleep and/or study. At all other times cooperative quiet is expected, which means that residents must respect the right of others for quiet study.

#### Alcohol

The legal drinking age in Nova Scotia is 19 years. If you are of legal drinking age, you are permitted to drink in the HMCA King's Wardroom and your residence room, but you must do so responsibly. Alcohol is not permitted in common areas.

Many students do not drink alcohol, contrary to popular opinion. However, if you choose to drink, we encourage you to follow Canada's Low-Risk Drinking Guidelines: women should have no more than 3 drinks on a special occasion, to a maximum of 10 per week, and men no more than 4 drinks of a special occasion, to a maximum of 15 per week. #### Consumption of Illegal Drugs and Abuse of Legal Drugs

The use, possession, production (including growing), promotion or trafficking of illegal drugs or narcotics on College property or in residence buildings/private rooms is a criminal offence and absolutely prohibited. The abuse, unauthorized possession or trafficking of legal drugs is also prohibited. Students who are known to have illegal drugs in their possession on College property, or are known to be using drugs on College property, or who are in residence rooms where drugs are being used, or are known to have been used, risk immediate suspension and/or eviction from residence.

#### **Physical and Verbal Aggression**

All students have a right to live in an environment that is free from violence and aggression. Physical and verbal aggression is not tolerated.

#### Harassment & Discrimination

Individuals or groups exhibiting harassment or discriminating behavior to another student or groups of students on the basis of race, ancestry, place of origin, colour, ethnic origin, citizenship, creed/religion, sex, sexual orientation, disability, age, etc. are subject to discipline. Let's make our community safe for everyone.

All students have access to the University's Equity Officer who handles issues of equity, racial equity, harassment, and sexual harassment, and to our Accessibility Officer. The University's Equity and Harassment Policy can be found <u>online</u> in the Yellow Book at www.ukings.ca/policies. For information on these services please speak with the Dean of Students, the Registrar, or the Office of the President.

#### Cleanliness

You are responsible for keeping you room clean. Cleaning supplies are available in the cleaning closets located on each floor in Alex Hall. You are required to store you food in sealed containers in order to prevent pests.

#### **Room Inspections**

Your residence room will be inspected regularly throughout the year to ensure that it is clean, garbage is being disposed of properly, and food is stored in air tight containers. Staff will also inspect for damage to your room. Residents will be given 24 hours' notice prior to entry. Students may be asked to clean their rooms if deemed necessary by staff.

#### Common & Residence Rooms

Common rooms are for the general use of all resident students. Furnishings in any given room are not to be removed. Bookings may be made through the Front Desk of Alex Hall, where you can also sign out access cards and keys, if needed.

#### Smoking

Smoking is not permitted anywhere on campus. If you wish to smoke, you must leave campus.

#### Guests

Non-resident students are welcome as visitors to residence. Overnight guests must not stay beyond 3 consecutive nights and their presence must be approved by the roommates of those students living in double rooms. Other residents must not be inconvenienced by guests. Residents are advised that they are responsible at all times for the behaviour and conduct of their guests.

#### Windows

For safety reasons, please don't sit or hang out of your window, remove any of the window sections, or throw or drop things out the window.

#### Roof

Climbing on the roof of any University building is extremely dangerous and strictly prohibited. If you are found doing so you may be evicted from residence. Damage to King's Property.

Damage attributed to individuals will be charged to the individual. Damage to public areas of the residence, not attributable to an individual or group, will be charged equally to all members of the floor, wing, or Bay as appropriate.

#### **Room Changes**

Typically, room changes are not permitted. Roommates having difficulty are encouraged to communicate with one another and to speak with their Don who can facilitate this process. No room change or switch will occur before the end of September and room changes will only occur in extreme circumstances when authorized by the Dean. Unauthorized room changes are not permitted. Students discovered to have done so will be asked to return to their designated room and fines may be levied.

#### Pets

Pets are not permitted in residence (the exception are non-poisonous fish in small covered aquariums), except for documented medical purposes.

#### Moving Out During Term

Sometimes students move out of residence during the academic year. If this applies to you, here are the steps.

#### Step 1:

Any student who wishes to leave residence during term will be held responsible for his or her residence fees for the full academic year, or until a replacement, acceptable to the college, is found.

#### Step 2:

Make sure that you complete a withdrawal form, which is available from the Registrar's Office. It will be necessary for you have the form approved by the Dean of Students. If you are a Foundation Year Programme student, you must also speak with the Registrar's Office and the Associate Director of Student Affairs.

#### Step 3:

Empty and clean your fridge, clean your room, and empty your garbage. Cleaning supplies are available from the front desk of Alexandra Hall. Ensure that all personal belongings are removed from your room. Any remaining items will be discarded.

#### Step 4:

Within 24 hours of your planned departure, you must have Facilities Management staff check your room using the Room Checklist you approved out when you arrived. Call the front desk of Alexandra Hall to make an appointment. Facilities staff are available Monday through Friday, 10:00-11:30AM and 1:00-3:30 PM.

#### Step 5:

Visit the Students Accounts Office, located on the second floor in the A&A building to settle your account. Student Accounts is open Monday through Friday, 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM.

#### Step 6:

Return your academic gown and room key/access card to the front desk of Alexandra Hall before you leave. Otherwise, you will be charged for replacements.

#### Step 7:

If you will remain a King's student, be sure that the Registrar's Office updates your local address

Early withdrawal may be granted in the event that the Student graduates, undertakes a co-op placement, internship or practicum required for academic purposes outside the metro area, or is unable to continue in residence for other reasons acceptable to the University. The University shall have sole discretion in determining what constitutes valid grounds for early withdrawal from residence. It is the Student's responsibility to provide written notification to the Residence Office that they will not be remaining in residence for the full academic year at least two weeks prior to their departure from residence. Students who wish to live in residence for only one term must indicate this intention when completing the residence application. First preference for rooms will be given to those students intending to stay for both Fall and Winter terms. Withdrawal granted on medical grounds must be substantiated by medical documentation within one (1) calendar month after the date of withdrawal.

An additional administrative fee of \$175.00 will be levied in the case of early withdrawal from an assigned room. Students evicted from residence will forfeit all residence fees.

#### Moving Out

All students are required to vacate their room within 24 hours of their last academic commitment in December and April. Exam schedules are posted in October and February. Please make your travel plans accordingly.

During the December holiday break, you do not have to remove your belongings. You will, however, receive instructions on how to properly leave your room for the holidays. Students are required to leave 24 hours after their last academic commitment. Please do not make travel plans until your exam schedule is known. Should you need to stay in residence beyond the 24-hour allowance (either for winter holidays or at the end of the year), you must submit an extension request form to the front desk of Alexandra Hall. All extension requests are granted at the discretion of the Assistant Dean of Students.

#### Safety Bulletins

The Dean's Office issues safety memos throughout the year in the event that there are particular safety issues about which you need to be informed. Please read these notices! You will find them in your Dalhousie email account, and posted on your Don's bulletin board.

Dalhousie Security also communicates to students via your Dalhousie email account. Check this account regularly.

#### DalAlert

Notification about on-campus emergencies such as fires, violent incidents and storm closures are sent via text message to your cellular telephone through Dalhousie's DalAlert messaging services. **VISIT** <u>https://dalalert.dal.ca</u> **AND REGISTER YOUR CELLPHONE**.

#### DalSAFE

DalSAFE is a new mobile app providing quick and easy access to Security Services, Tiger Patrol, interactive maps, campus notices, parking info, and many other resources to enhance personal safety. #### **Fire Safety**

The University has adopted a number of fire safety policies designed to ensure your safety and those of your fellow students. Please make yourself aware of them. Any student found in contravention of the policies risks significant fines from both the University and Provincial authorities. For example, you must ensure that your room door is not propped open. Further, you are not to use the fire escapes except during an emergency. Being caught on the fire escapes carries a hefty fine. **Fire Drills & Alarms** 

Should the fire alarm sound, IMMEDIATELY VACATE THE BUILDING through the nearest clear exit and proceed to a safe distance away from the building. Keep off the driveway so as not to

inhibit the movement of emergency personnel on campus. Fire safety diagrams are posted on the back of your residence room door. Please read them. Individuals who fail to leave the building during a drill are subject to substantial fines.

#### If you are unable to vacate your room...

- Close the door, but do not deadbolt it so to provide easy access for firefighters
- Seal cracks with wet towels or sheets to keep out smoke
- Stay low to the floor to prevent smoke inhalation
- Dial 911 and let the Fire Department know where you are
- Signal to firefighters where you are by waving out the window
- Wait to be rescued

*Fire Equipment.* Tampering with any fire safety equipment, including fire extinguishers, hoses, fire escapes/landings, sprinklers, or disabling smoke alarms is strictly prohibited.

*Sprinklers.* Please do not tamper with the sprinklers by hanging clothes or other objects from them or any residence piping. The sprinklers are a vital component of the King's fire-safety system. Their proper operation is vital to providing a safe environment for you and other students.

*Fire Doors.* Please do not prop open any doors in residence, including your residence room door or the fire separation doors which can be found throughout the residence. They are designed with automatic closures in order to limit the spread of fire and keep exit routes clear of fire and smoke. They are an important component of the campus safety system.

*Fire Hazards*. Objects in hallways are considered hazards. Personal items such as bikes, boots/shoes, boxes, chairs, etc. may not be left in hallways. Candles, incense, open-element appliances (grills, toasters, etc.), halogen lamps and dangerous goods such as barbecue lighters are prohibited, as they pose significant fire hazards.

*Fire Inspections.* Fire safety inspections of the residence are conducted on a regular basis by university personnel and/or government inspectors. Under provincial law, the university residence, including individual residence rooms, may be subject to an inspection with 24-hours' notice.

#### Theft

It is your responsibility to ensure that your valuables are kept in a secure location. Do not leave your valuables in common rooms. Keep your doors and windows closed and locked whenever you are not in your room. The College is not responsible for any lost or stolen items. If you do discover a theft, inform your don immediately. If you witness a theft in progress, stay safe and well away from the area. Do not try to intervene, and inform your don or the Dean as soon as possible.

#### **Health Services**

Should you fall ill or require non-emergency medical treatment, you can access Dalhousie Health Services located at 1246 LeMarchant St., next to the Dal SUB. Services offered include routine medical exams, anonymous STI testing and sports medicine.

#### Health Insurance

Canadian students are covered under their provincial health plans. All incoming students are also automatically enrolled in the University Student Health & Dental Plan. Some students are also covered by their parent or guardian's health plan and may be eligible to opt-out of the university plan. #### Illness & Sick Trays

Should you happen to fall ill or have a medical problem, please tell your Don. We will do our best to support and accommodate your needs. You can also get a sick tray brought to you either by a fellow student or one of the Dons. A sick tray card which must be taken to Prince Hall along with the sick student's Dal Card.

#### **Personal Safety Information**

- Close and lock your door before you go to bed.
- Close and lock your doors whenever you leave your room, including trips to the bathroom, or when you are going down the hall to visit friends.
- Do not allow strangers into residence buildings. If you see a suspicious person, call your Don or Patrol.
- Be aware and alert when travelling across King's and Dalhousie's campuses, especially at night. Do not travel alone and always have money for a bus or cab back to campus. If necessary, use the "cab fund" at the front desk of Alex Hall (please return the money within 12 hours).

- If you plan to leave campus for an extended period of time, leave a note for your don and tell a friend so we know when to expect you back!
- If you are returning to campus at night consider using Tiger Patrol, a Dalhousie studentstaffed walk-home service or their scheduled shuttle bus from 6:00pm-1:15am daily. For more info visit: <u>www.dal.ca/tigerpatrol</u> or call 902-494-6400.

#### Phone

Residence students have unlimited local phone calls and internet access. You can make long distance calls by using pre-paid long distance phone cards, available for purchase at the King's Bookstore (basement of the NAB), or at many retail outlets. Wireless is available throughout campus using Dalhousie's WPA encryption system.

Remember to setup your voicemail on your phone.

#### Internet

Every student in residence can gain direct access to the Internet through the university's local area network, under a service called "ResNet." This service is included in the cost of residence and all registered King's students receive an email account with their NetID. For more info check out www.ukings.ca/computers-internet-telephone.

#### Printing from your Room

#### **Computer Labs**

Computer labs are located in the King's Library and in the Lower Level of Alex Hall. Printing is available at the front desk of both locations for a nominal fee.

#### Mail

Your mail will be delivered to the Front Desk of Alex Hall. Packages sent to you may be picked up at the A&A Reception Desk. A list of packages will be posted daily at Alex Hall front desk. Students living in the Roost pick up their mail at the A&A Reception Desk. The closest Canada Post mailbox for outgoing mail is located on Coburg Road, at the entrance to Lord Dalhousie Drive. The nearest post office is at Lawton's on the corner of Robie St. & Spring Garden Rd.

#### Laundry

Laundry facilities are available in the lower level of Alex Hall, the lower level of Middle Bay and in the A&A building tunnel below Cochran Bay. The machines are managed by Coinamatic (coinamatic.com). Each load costs \$1.25 to wash and \$1.25 to dry. Students must pick up a laundry card from Alex Hall desk to use the machines. Funds may then be loaded onto the card at the machine located in the basement of King's A&A using debit or credit cards. Students must supply their own laundry detergent. If you discover a broken washing machine or dryer, please report it to Alex Hall Desk (ext 132). Also, any problems with your laundry card should be reported to Alex Hall desk.

#### Keys & Smart Cards

Your smart card will provide you with 24 hour access to <u>your</u> Residence Bay or Floor. Keys and Smart Cards must not be lent to other individuals, including other residents for security reasons.

Locked Out of Your Room? Go to Alex Hall desk to sign out a spare key or smart card. All keys & cards must be returned within 15 minutes. Failure to return the key/card in that time may result in a fine.

#### Lost Keys/Smart Cards

Lost keys/smart cards will be replaced for a fee. Go to Alex Hall desk request a new one. The fee will be charged to your student account. All outstanding charges will begin accruing interest after 30 days from date replacement card/key is made. Payment may be made at Student Accounts on the  $2^{nd}$  floor of King's Administration Building.

#### Recycling & Garbage

Compost, recycling and garbage bins located on each floor in Alexandra Hall and the basement level of each bay. Extra garbage bags are available in the Student Cleaning Closets located in Alex Hall or at Alex Hall desk. *You are not permitted to place garbage from your rooms in common areas and bathrooms*.

#### Personal Items in Bathrooms

Please do not leave any personal items in the bathrooms. These include, but are not limited to, toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo, conditioner and soap of any kind. Any personal items left in the bathrooms will be discarded by the cleaning staff as the items interfere with their daily cleanup.

#### Refrigerators

Each residence room has been provided with a mini-refrigerator. These units must remain in the designated room. It is your responsibility to ensure that it is left clean and in good repair at the end of the academic year. Any damages and/or misuse of the unit will be billed to your student account. If you unplug the fridge, be sure to prop the door open or mould could grow. Any problems should be reported to Alex Hall desk @ ext.132.

#### DalCard (King's ID/Meal Card/U- Pass)

The DalCard is your student identification card, Library card, provides you with access to the dining hall and is needed to pay for printing. It is required in order to use the U-Pass for Metro Transit. You can get your DalCard at any time during the year by going to the DalCard office which is located at 6230 Coburg Road (on Dal campus), a five minute walk from the King's Quad. Phone: 902-494-2334.

#### **U-Pass (Transit Pass)**

U-Pass is a special transit pass specifically designed for full time King's and Dalhousie students. It is included in your tuition fees. The U-Pass lets you ride Halifax Transit buses, ferries and Community Transit buses from September to April. Your U-Pass sticker will be placed directly on your DalCard. For further information contact the DalCard office at 902-494-2334.

#### Skateboards, Rollerblades and Shopping Carts

No skateboards or rollerblades are allowed to be used in the residence buildings or in individual rooms. Shopping carts are not permitted on campus.

#### Storage

Unfortunately, due to limited space, we are unable to provide students with any storage space on campus. Bikes may be stored at the outdoor bicycle racks located around campus. All items left behind at the end of the school year will be discarded.

#### **Food Services**

Meals are provided in Prince Hall, the campus dining hall located in King's A&A, which is managed by Sodexo Food Services. For information about the specific services offered, including dining hall hours, please contact Celine Beland (Account Director) ext.155 or celine.beland@ukings.ca. You must have your DalCard in order to gain access to the dining hall. If you lose your DalCard you will not be permitted access until you replace it.

#### Kitchens for Student Use

There is a kitchen available to students located on the first floor of Alex Hall. It has a full size fridge, stove, microwave and sink as well as a table and chairs. Students must supply pots, pans & dishes and cleaning supplies. Please be courteous and keep these kitchens clean and tidy for all users. Concerns or questions should be directed to Alex Hall desk.

#### Formal Meal

Formal Meal occurs once a month in Prince Hall. It is an opportunity for the College community to gather together for dinner. Academic gowns must be worn. Residence students must pick up their ticket in Prince Hall in the days leading up to that month's formal meal. Free tickets for Day Students are available at Alex Hall. Queue outside Prince Hall by 5:50pm. If for any reason you need

#### **Big Night**

Bringing together students, faculty and staff to share their artistic (and sometimes, not-so-artistic) gifts with each other, Big Night is the College's annual exhibit of campus talent held in March. It is an evening of food and entertainment, allowing students, staff and faculty to showcase their strengths. Featuring musicians, dancers, and artists of every sort, Big Night has proven more and more successful each year.

#### Academic Gowns

Academic gowns are distributed at the beginning of the academic year to resident students. Each student is responsible for his/her gown and for returning it in good condition. Your residence fees include a \$100 gown damage deposit. If the gown is returned to Alex Hall desk at the end of the school year in good condition \$90 of the fee is credited back to your student account in May, with the remaining \$10 used as a cleaning charge for the gown. Gowns must be returned by April 30.

#### Matriculation

Matriculation is your formal entry into the King's Community. Dressed in the College's traditional academic gowns, students inscribe their names in the Matricula, symbolically joining the community of thousands of King's who have come before them.

#### **Residence** Applications

Residence Applications are made available in November of each year and can be found online at <u>www.ukings.ca</u>. If you are returning to King's, you can apply to residence as a *Returning Student*. Returning students are guaranteed single rooms, and can choose between four different meal plans. Our upper-year students are an important component of residence life, passing on the spirit and tradition of the College to the incoming class.

#### **Residence Checklists**

Upon arrival in residence you will find a Residence Checklist in your room. The checklist reflects the condition your residence room. These forms must be completed and returned to Alexandra Hall desk in September. At the end of the academic year Facilities will use these lists to confirm the room condition. Failure to return the completed form may result in the loss of your damage deposit. See the following listing for a partial list of damage charges.


